How Logs Are Handled in Maine.

Up in the northwest wilderness of Maine some capitalists, who have bought the timber lands of seven townships, are constructing an enormous endless chain, worked by 40 horse-power engines, to convey their logs over 2,500 feet of decline to the waters of Carry Brook, by which they are to be swept into Moosehead Lake, and eventually reach the mills at Gardiner by way of the Kennebec. The chain begins at the edge of a dam which has been formed across the Penobscot at Sebago. Here the logs are collected. The chain is of steel, with links a foot in length. Every 8 feet there is a "chair," or a bar, running across the chain, and on either end of the bar are iron standards to hold the log in place. The chain runs in a trough, and the log rests on the chain and is held in place by the iron standards. The motive power will be two forty-horse-power engines. One will be located in the center, and one at the further end of the stretch, and it is believed that the chain will move at the rate of 200 feet a minute. While this system of handling lumber is by no means novel, speeding an endless chain at such a rate is new, but competent engineers pronounce it possible. It is expected that it will carry 8,000 pieces, or 1,000,000 feet, every twenty-four hours. It is estimated that it will cost not far from 25c per 1,000 to carry the logs.

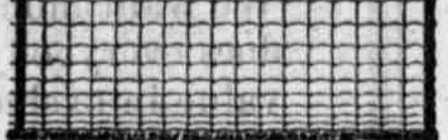

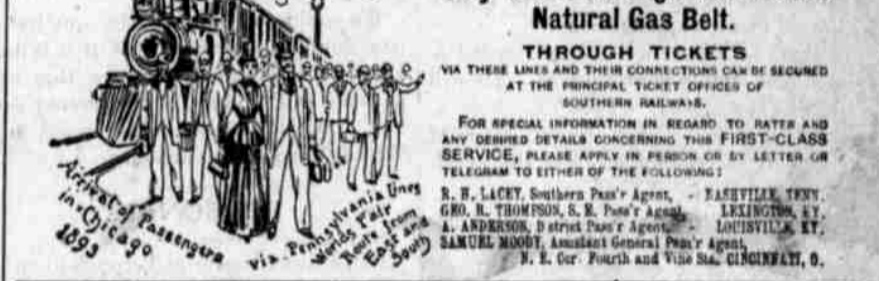
